
Grays is not a place I will ever visit again, but it had some public art and a Greggs. I was proud that I managed to eat a steak bake and drink a tea and didn't get any of it down my pristine white shirt! Back towards down, and a debate how to transfer onto the Elizabeth Line - into FSt and walk to Liverpool Street, or tube West Ham to Whitechapel, or DLR south to Custom House? I went for the latter, and found I needed to wait and change Low to High at Canning Town - who cares, I like the DLR.





Custom House Liz Line station is on the north side of the DLR station (Baker is wrong) and is huge. It is the only LL station with no platform

doors. I noted the excellent disabled signage.







The trains are also huge - with complete walk through, and decent access. Just one intermediate station between there and Abbey Wood, where the LL terminates on the north side, which doesn't make it easy to transfer onto the Southern services. I went for an explore, then went back into London.

















Liz Line is not a tube line. It does not have lots of stops. It has long sections with fast running. A train every five minutes seemed a bit much, but it was well filled once we got to Canary Wharf - I enjoyed the scenery. At the moment nothing is running from the middle section out to Heathrow/Reading (or indeed Liverpool Street to Shenfield), so you have to travel up and it is a long way up. The station is on the south side



of the terminus. I had a quick explore, then went back.






















Up to Finsbury Park, where the next one south was cancelled, so I sat with my latte and watched the world go by - happy memories! Back to Moorgate (separate lines south of the





Park - and I wonder if I will ever be able to do the links through to Canonbury (I did it several times in the days when Liverpool Street Cambridge trains would be diverted up the Great Northern - sadly things like that never happen today).







I took the Met back to Farringdon and must go back and explore that LL station sometime - very different styles. Then a short walk along Hatton Gardens to St Etheldreda's church for the wedding. Afterwards the bus to KX, a walk in the rain to St P, and I joined a busy train
